After intensive investigation Denver author William Adler presents startling new evidence that virtually seals Joe's innocence and the guilt of another man. Hill's gripping story is set against a brief but electrifying moment in U.S. history when class warfare raged and Hill was the union's preeminent songwriter. In death he became the unwilling but venerated martyr, celebrated by the likes of Woody Guthrie and Bob Dylan, and immortalized in the ballad, "I Dreamed I Saw Joe Hill Last Night."
